My belief is that an individual is only as valuable as he can help others. I want to go to bed at night knowing that I helped someone. I think everyone should. In fact many people do; doctors, nurses and Red Cross workers, etc. and they dedicate their lives to it too. Can you imagine what the world would be like if every person cared that much about their neighbor or stranger alike? There would be no crime, intolerance and even war. When you get people together that have that same purpose, which is what we have in the Sea Organization and with church parishioners, apparently some people can't handle that because of their own personal sordid agenda. Yet, those are the people that CNN listens to. Anybody in their right mind would question the sanity of CNN at that point. My only question for you is: Should CNN value people that dedicate their lives to selflessly helping people or should they harm them. If the answer is the latter (and that is apparently what you're planning) then my question for you personally is: How can you even live with yourself?

Don't you want your children to grow up in a better world, where human rights is a fact, where people aren't victim to drugs and everybody has the opportunity to learn and live freely? Do you know that in your greed for sensationalism and by telling harmful lies you're actually hurting any efforts for any and all charitable organizations to reach and make a difference in the world? Is the result of harming individuals who selflessly help people something you're willing to live with?

As I said, I've been working in the Sea Org and at Golden Era for 19 years. Since I decided this was going to be what I do in life I have never looked back. I have been the Art Director here for 14 of those years and I can't tell you of a more rewarding job. With the direction from Chairman of the Board RTC, Mr. David Miscavige, I have been part of a program since the beginning of the millenium to bring the look of our materials and churches to a whole new level. To work with someone who has the vision and dedication to helping Man he has is beyond description. If anyone has made Scientology into what it is today, it is he. He raises the bar look-wise and no matter the circumstance he always takes the

time to ask me how I am doing and that I have everything I need. You're never "on your own" when you work with him but you know what you're doing is always going to come out okay and that is a certainty and security I've never experienced with anyone else. The fact that every part of what you work on is perfect and something to be proud of lifts you and in that way he inspires me to lift others around me that I work with in the same way. That's the kind of man he is. A reflection of his compassion in his leadership is the very property I work at. I have never experienced working conditions like these anywhere and anyone who comes here is shocked by the beauty and how happy the staff are, yet CNN won't even come and look but will instead listen to liars.

To illustrate who Mr. Miscavige is I will give you an example of one of the things he has personally done for me. My father was suffering lung cancer. At the time I was in the middle of preparing an event here in California and I had a deadline to meet. Mr. Miscavige got word of what was happening to my dad and the next thing I knew he had me booked on a flight to Sweden to see my dad the same night. He also arranged for me to bring a friend because he knew that it can get heavy emotionally and wanted to assist me in anything I needed while I was gone. When we arrived in Sweden a car was rented for us and we drove to the hospital. During my stay there Mr. Miscavige called me several times on the phone to make sure I was okay and that I had everything I needed. My dad passed away in my arms and it was definitely a tragic moment for me and thanks to Mr. Miscavige I was able come through it okay and, even more important for me, I was able to help my sisters and relatives get through it too. He was very compassionate about my loss and he supported me like my best friend. On my way back to the States he arranged a tour for me of our new printing facilities in Denmark and he had people there who showed me around and cared for me. He then arranged for me to visit our church in London and we caught a morning flight back to LA. I was treated very well the whole way. But what really amazed me was his care and the fact that he would call me on the phone and make sure my family and I got through it okay. That's the kind of man he is - selfless and abundant with care.

I happen to have worked with the people you're interviewing and I know what type of people they are. The reason they never fit in here is because they hated working and couldn't even participate, let alone produce a product themselves, despite getting all the help and support they could ever want and more. The only thing they ever did was complain about work or that what we produced here was "too good". Who wants to work with people like that? Yet, those are the people you listen to as a "trusted news sources".
